Lights On!

We are now participating in the Lights On! Program. It's a common scenario, an officer pulls over a vehicle with a burned-out bulb except, now, instead of a ticket or warning, the officer hands the driver a Lights On! voucher for free light repair. The drivers can then redeem those vouchers for free repairs at any participating auto service provider.

A broken taillight or turn signal can sometimes mean choosing between a minor auto repair or

buying groceries for the family. It can also spark a downward economic spiral that for some yields multiple tickets, confrontations with law enforcement, and even vehicle impoundment. The Lights On! program has the potential to disrupt the downward spiral and build goodwill between police departments and the communities they serve.

Due to instances of police brutality in some cities, many communities fear and distrust the

officers that are intended to serve and protect them. The Lights On! program strives to heal and transform police-community relationships. When participating officers pull over a driver for a burnt-out bulb, they can move with more confidence and hope knowing that they have a tool, a Lights On! voucher, to make this interaction restorative. We look forward to the positive interactions this program will inspire.

Domestic Assault Arrests

On Saturday, July 2nd, **Officers Val Esquivel, Brad Arens, Spencer Angle, Jacob Charlton and Michael Shuda** were dispatched to a reported domestic assault. On arrival, Ofc. Esquivel met with the victim, and noted she was limping. The victim reported that her husband, Mark Campbell, 54, had assaulted her, kicking her and dragging her across the floor. She also reported that Campbell strangled her. Officers could see marks, cuts, and blood from her injuries. Campbell had fled the scene prior to officers' arrival. Early the next morning, **Officer Matt Kolling** responded to a suspicious vehicle in a city park, and located Campbell using the bathroom. He was arrested without incident. Campbell was



charged with Domestic Assault and Domestic Assault by Strangulation. His bail was set at \$5,000 with conditions. A Domestic Assault No Contact Order (DANCO) was issued.

On Sunday, July 10th, **Officers Brandon McCarthy, Lance Ulrich and Tyler Wilson** responded to a reported domestic assault at a bar. On arrival, the officers met with Campbell. He told officers that a friend had dropped him off at the bar and he saw his wife there. He denied being with her, but admitted to telling her that he could not be around her. The officers spoke with witnesses who reported the couple arrived at the bar together and were talking to each other. Another witness reported hearing Campbell making threats towards the victim. Campbell was arrested and jailed. He was charged with DANCO Violation, and his bail was set at \$20,000 with conditions.

Speed Enforcement

Officers, deputies and troopers statewide are joining forces all month to look for speeders endangering not only their own lives but the lives of others. Over the last two years with the pandemic in Minnesota, some drivers believed they'd been given a license to speed and were treating the more open roads like a raceway.

Speeding is a costly choice. A ticket will typically cost a driver more than \$110 with court fees. Fines double for those speeding 20 mph over the limit, and drivers can lose their license for six months for going 100 mph or more.
